He was a faithful Christian who lived in Lubbock, Texas. He is survived by a wife and two children, one brother and one sister. His family is close so he will be sorely missed. This family has suffered through quite a bit during the past three years. It's good that their family is large and close so that they can lean upon each other during this time of loss.

Listen to this verse. Behold, how good and pleasant it is when brothers dwell in unity! (Psalm 133:1). Isn't that a beautiful verse? It's beautiful to read, but it's even better to live in a local congregation of the Lord's faithful. That's what we're striving to do. And that's what every Christian should be striving to do. It's an ugly mess when brethren don't do this and its sin! Nothing good can come from strife. And the God of heaven will not tolerate strife and those who sow discord. I say that to say this. God has and continues to bless this congregation with peace – good attitudes and unity. And we're prayerfully working hard to maintain this so that we can continue to accomplish the kind of good work the Lord will be pleased with. May God help us and bless us with attitudes of love and peace. As long as He does and as long as we listen we will continue to glorify Him and bring honor to His great name.
