In spite of our social/cultural hindrances, we're keeping on preaching the gospel, hoping to find good hearts, willing to build spiritual life's. We ask your patience and prayers to continue in all this.

**PERSONAL NEWS.** Always thanking God, we are doing fine. Our two grandchildren, Alessandro (5 years next October) and Alice (3 years) are growing well. They are a great joy for all the family. It seems impossible to think how fast they're growing (and we're getting older!).

As I already wrote you, our daughter Valeria is waiting for another baby, coming sometimes next October. She's doing well. All the tests and medical check ups are OK. The baby will be a boy and his name will be Samuele. Some extra work for her and us!

On Sunday morning, after worship, I am continuing the teaching from Isaiah. We reached chapter 40. I'm trying to give a general overview of the book. So far I'm very pleased of the developments of this study. The brethren are following with interest and participation.
